## President's Letter

Macintoshes are not supposed to break. Until recently, I seem to have been quite fortunate in that every Mac I've owned has dutifully followed this edict. Last week, two days before the March RMUG general meeting, my luck ran out. Turning on my relatively new G5 iMac all I got was a measly little power light to flash on and off...1 flash...I try again...1 flash. Knowing that Macs don't break I try again...1 flash. My wife and I use our Mac for work and school, we needed it back up and healthy quickly. Using the phone we went to find help, to Apple Care of course. We understood that the Apple Store in Sacramento could fix it in about an hour.

Great, off to Sacramento we went, a 5 hour Saturday drive, well worth it if our friend can be revived by Saturday night. Apple stores have generally nice people, the Arden Fair store is no different. Although; Saturday I learned how the repair process works. First, you fill out an online page describing your problem on a laptop that sits about 2 feet from the 'Genius Bar'. The Genius Bar is where you go if you have difficult questions, or sick Macs. The online page puts you into this queue just to step up to the Genius Bar - my wait, about 2 hours. I also learned that if they couldn't fix it there, they ship it off to get repaired. This would take about 12 DAYS. Upon hearing this, some very unprofessional words came out of my mouth that would probably offend the religious, sexual and moral preferences of anyone that heard it. Well, I waited my 2 hours by wandering around the mall - thrilling. Back at the Apple Store, Trevor, the resident genius, opened up the iMac for me. Little Country Church informed Dale that they would need the rooms we use after April. We are looking for a new meeting place. We currently use one room that will hold at least 75 people and a smaller room for no more than 20 people. Current hours are from 9:00 a.m. to noon on the 2nd Saturday of each month, but we would entertain all possibilities.

Tips from Michael Peters:

.Something should be printed with ink jett printers at least once a week, color as well as black, to make sure the tiny nozzles remain open. If nothing else, run a Nozzle Check Pattern.

Should the nozzles clog and not open using the cleaning recommended in your printer's User's Guide, you can purchase a glycerin cartridge specific to your printer from InkforArt.

. Unopened ink cartridges should be stored in an upright position to avoid possible drying of ink in the nozzles.

Weekly and monthly computer maintenance:  
Weekly.

1) OS X - Run Disk Warrior (to optimize your directories). OS 9 – Can still use Norton Utilities.  
2) Repair Permissions (gives you permission to access files).

Applications – Utilities – Disc Utilities – Select name of Hard Drive – First Aid Tab – Click 'Repair Permissions'.

If you have a second drive, it should be on desktop and on when you repair permissions.  
Monthly.

Leave your computer on overnight at end of every month to run monthly maintenance.

System Preferences –

Energy Saver Control Panel – Slide slider to 'Never sleep'.

Reset to preference the next day. OR use Cocktail which can be downloaded free. Run CRON and other tests as needed. Cocktail questions? Ask Michael.

. Use FireWire Target Disc Mode to get information off an old computer (OS9 platform) to new OS X computer.

Both computers must have FireWire. Start old computer holding 'T' key down. Start new computer. Click Hard Drive – Users – Your home icon – make new folder – click on icon for old computer – open using 'Open' (do not double click) – drag folder or files from old computer to new folder – 'Eject' other computer hard drive icon when finished – restart old computer before trying to use.

Barbara Benefield reviewed TurboTax for figuring and filing your Federal taxes. She said the figures you use in Turbo- Tax are only as good as your money management program. She uses Quicken. If you set up the categories to correspond to TurboTax categories, the figures from Quicken can be transferred automatically. State tax forms can be downloaded for free. Both Federal and State taxes can be done on line. Easy to follow help files in video format. Thank you, Barbara, for a very interesting review.

## MAC MINI SETUP:

I set up my first Macintosh Mini today, and I will say I was very satisfied. The machine I set up came with a 1.42GHz G4 processor, 80GB HD, 512MB RAM, Airport Extreme, SuperDrive, Bluetooth, Apple wired keyboard and Logitech 2 button & scrool wheel mouse.

This little dynamo really is 6 1/2 X 6 1/2 X 2 and it has a power brick about one third the size of the computer. It is extremely quiet and the speaker was just barely adequate for iTunes. The CD seemed slightly slow burning a 230MB CD of MP3 files, but I am comparing it to one on a \$3,000 laptop and a \$3,000 G5, so it really wasn't that bad. In every other way I loved this

little G4. The Mac Mini seemed to move just about as fast as my tower 1.25GHz G4s, and the Mini uses laptop drives, so I was quite impressed. I opened and closed Photoshop files and did the 100MBs of updates, and at every step this seemed like a great little machine.

If anyone with a G3 of any flavor is looking for a leap into OS-X with 95% of the whistles and bells for 70% of the price of what a nice 17" iMac G5 would run you, I can highly recommend the little Mac Mini with a third party monitor. Anyone with an old G4 tower they were thinking of upgrading, I would seriously look at the Mac Mini as a viable alternative.

If you wanted to hot rod your Mac Mini and void your warranty, there are a couple of good options. Since the stock 80GB HD is 5400 RPM, you could purchase a server level 7200 RPM HD and replace the stock internal HD with the faster server HD. When you purchase a hard drive, if you look very very closely you will find how many hours per month or year this drive is expected to be spinning at full speed, and server drives - the answer is 100% of the time. This is quite often listed as 720 hours per month. Of course, we ordered our hypothetical hot rod machine with 256MB of RAM to save money. Now that the case is open adding the new HD, lets drop in a high quality 1GB RAM chip as we take the old one out, as there is only one memory slot in a Mac Mini. There are several large corporations that are now using Mac Mini computers with upgraded HDs and external FireWire HDs as their primary mail servers.

Epson Stylus Photo 960 Printer

Since the printer has seen very little use, the cartridges went "out of date" and it has not worked correctly since. I helped Larry put several 3rd party cartridges in the printer, even tried one NEW Black Epson brand cartridge, but could not get the printer to come back to life. Maybe if a whole new set of Epson brand cartridges were bought for it, that might work. They are \$12.34 at the Epson store and \$9 and \$10 at Amazon.com.

Larry has decided if anyone wants this printer they can have it for FREE, just pick it up at the next RMUG meeting. If you don't want to wait just e-mail him or me.

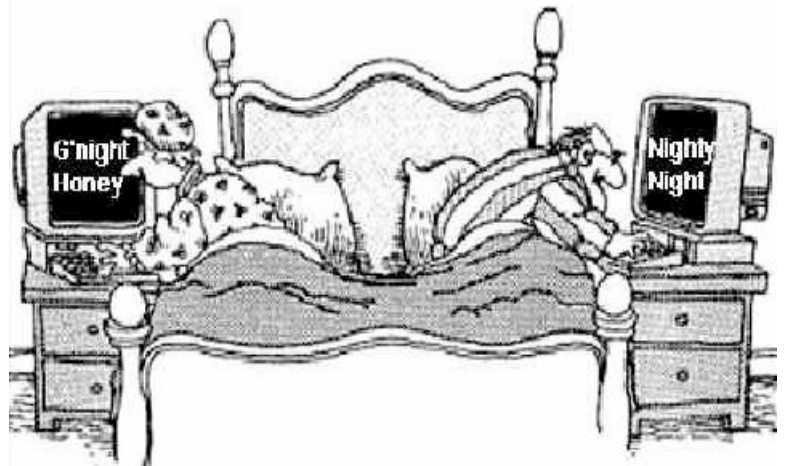

## Apple Here to Stay:

Nearly a decade ago, just a few months after Microsoft shipped Windows 95, I asked Bill Gates (news - web sites) if it was a conscious decision in the development of that product to give Windows more of a Mac look and feel. Of course I knew he'd say it wasn't, but I couldn't resist asking. "There was no goal even to compete with Macintosh (news - web sites)," Gates proclaimed. "We don't even think of Macintosh as a competitor."

That was a crock, so I pressed the issue a little. I asked him how he accounted for the widespread perception that Windows 95 looked a lot like Mac 88, and whether the similarity was just a coincidence. I didn't expect a sobbing confession of mimicry, but I thought it would be cool to see how he'd respond. Surprisingly enough, Gates shifted gears and became more forthcoming.

"Some of the things in Windows 95 the Mac had earlier," he acknowledged, citing long file names, plug-and-play capabilities and built-in peer-to-peer networking. You know that had to be tough for him, so when he proclaimed that "there's a ton of things even in Windows 3.1 that the Mac doesn't have, that someday they'll probably add to their system, too," I didn't have the heart to call him on it when he didn't cite any examples.

That exchange with Gates came to mind after I read the "Giants in Jeopardy" story, part of Computerworld's special report on the future of IT. I found it striking that the IT visionaries who foresee a decline in Microsoft's dominance due to threats like Linux (news - web sites) and Google never mentioned Apple Computer.

Long before Linux became a thorn in Microsoft's side, Apple was a full-fledged pain in the company's you-know-what. On the one hand, it was in Microsoft's best interest for Apple to be successful, since software for the Mac has long been a huge business for

Microsoft. That, in fact, is why Microsoft invested \$150 million in Apple two years after the launch of Windows 95.

On the other hand, Microsoft had to deal with the abhorrence of being perceived as a technology follower, playing catch-up to the operating-system strides that Apple was making. That the best technology doesn't always win is a truth of life to which Microsoft owes much of its success, and Apple's technology never really bruised much more than the egos of Microsoft's executives. Still, it's interesting that Apple has become so completely marginalized in some quarters that it's no longer even part of the discussion of a future world order in which Microsoft is seen as less dominant.

I'm no IT futurist, but trust me, you need to include Apple in the discussion. If you don't believe it, I urge you to read Mark Hall's story in last week's issue "In Business to Stay." It's a compelling account of how a growing number of your peers are using Apple's technology in corporate environments outside of traditional Mac strongholds like publishing. One of the key attractions, Hall notes, is that the Mac OS X (news - web sites) operating system, with the exception of its user-interface and management tools code, is an open-source version of Unix (news - web sites) that's tuned for open-source offerings like the Apache Web server, MySQL database and JBoss application server.

Combine that open-source carrot with near-bulletproof security, and you begin to understand that we're talking about more than being late to the game with long file names here. The best technology may not always win. But it's not going to go away, either.

## Hints and Tips:

I found quite a few good tips in this month's edition of Hints & Tips at [www.mac-hints-tips.com](http://www.mac-hints-tips.com). Do mosey over there & see if there's some that interest you. Meanwhile here's a few I found especially interesting....

### Search Just a Folder

Why search the entire hard drive if you know the item is somewhere in one or two particular folders? Open Find with Command/F. Now drag the folder or folders you wish to search, uncheck all other choices and your search is much faster.

### Saving a PDF

Need to send a document to a friend who doesn't have the same application, fonts, or operating system as you do?

OS X 10.3 can create PDFs as easily as it

can print a document. In any application, choose File > Print. At the bottom of the print window, you'll see an option to "Save as PDF." Click it and then save the document to your desktop. You can then transfer this perfect duplicate of your document to anyone with OS X or Adobe Reader (including users with Unix or Windows).

### Cutting Through the Window Clutter

It's not only arguably the coolest feature in Panther; it's probably the best thing that happened to any OS since icons. It's called Expose, and when you invoke it, it instantly (and I mean instantly) shows you miniature versions (thumbnails) of every open window in the Finder and all open applications. That way you can instantly click and go right to the window you want.

Honestly, there's no way to adequately describe this feature, so go try it once and it will instantly (and I mean instantly) make sense.

Here's how: Open a few Finder windows, then open a couple documents in an application. Then press the F9 key, and every window temporarily miniaturizes. Click on the window you want -- it comes to the front, and everything else returns to normal. Is that slick or what?

### Site Hierarchy

Next time you're visiting a Web site and have burrowed down through several pages, hold down the Command key while you click on the page title (at the very top of the Safari window), and you'll see the path that leads from the page you're on back to the home page of that site. (This is very like the path you see when you Command/click a Finder window title.)

This can be very handy if a search engine has landed you in the middle of a site somewhere, and you want to understand where you are within that site.

## HINTS AND TIPS CONTINUED:

Got Red Eye?

Don't grab for the Visine! Just remove it in Photoshop. I learned a little technique that is fast and easy.

First open your image in Photoshop. Set the default foreground color to Black (use the "D" key). Then select the Brush Tool ("B"). Look at the info bar across the top for the "Mode" button. Change the mode of the Brush Tool to "Saturation." Select a brush that is slightly larger than the red pupil of the eye. Click with the brush tool over the red eye. Poof -- the red is gone and what is left is the black center of the eye. Repeat for the other eye. That's it! No more red eyes in any of your photos again.

The key to this technique is to have black as the foreground color, and the brush tool set to saturation. --Scott Armstrong

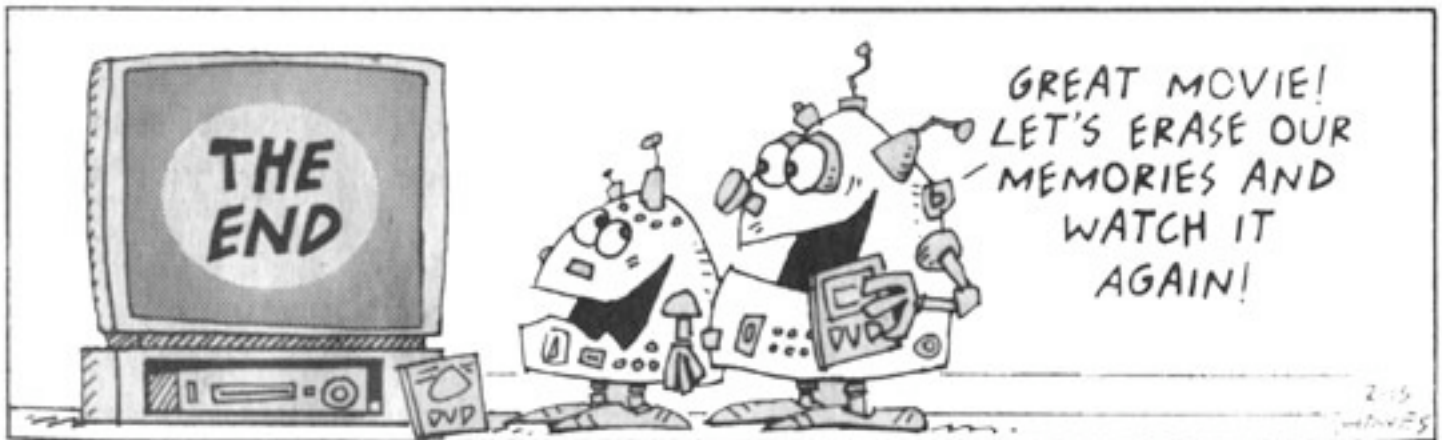
